### HOW TO USE YOUR MASTER CHECK SHEET

Due to the volume of records needed to adequately cover the parts and service of your machine, the **Master Check Sheet** was developed. This is the index to the parts and service coverage of an individual machine, each indicated by machine serial number.

In appropriate sections on the check sheet, you will be able to find six-digit numbers. These numbers are the keys to finding part numbers or service for the items listed.

For example: Under "Cylinders" in the Hydraulics section, you may find the number 522853 and its description ("Steering Cylinder"). This indicates that the parts coverage for that steering cylinder is listed under the number 522853 in the hydraulic section of your parts book. If you go to the relevant pages, you will find a drawing of the steering cylinder and a parts call-out listed. You now have the correct information to order a replacement cylinder or cylinder parts as required.

As another example: Under the Electrical section, you may find the number 572875, followed by the words "Electrical Schematic." Turning to the Electrical section of your service book, you will find a circuit drawing of the electrical system. The drawing will help you if you are troubleshooting the circuit.

**Please Note:** We do not attempt to list all of the available information related to every machine. However, we do try to list all the data needed for normal operation and service, and the information included is based on years of experience.

Part number variations are as follows:

1. Examples of parts numbers: 34566, 207561, 523097 or 800000.
2. Frequently, valves are used in more than one circuit and are listed accordingly. However, the coverage will be put in the book just once, usually in the position of the last entry.

Service bulletin number variations are as follows:

1. Currently, Parts and Service Bulletins are combined and written in four digits preceded by a zero (for example, 0025 - Lubrication). You may find other examples of the originals in your Master Check Sheet. All bulletins are subject to change.
2. Service coverage listed as 80-series numbers indicate permanent coverage that can be used to assist you in servicing your machine.

The following are explanations of some common symbols used in your Master Check Sheet:

- \* Related coverage has been back-ordered, as caused by the revision of existing data. Can also mean the development of new material is in progress.
- \*\* Material may change. Do not order from parts list without checking with the Parts Department first.
- (Ref.) Indicates material that is similar to, but not exact. Can be used for reference.

We now suggest that you study your Master Check Sheet along with the relevant Parts or Service Books—you will find the Master Check Sheet a very efficient index.
